The PA Camp is a crucial program for the BRIDE CLUB, where future BC leaders are trained. New PAs will return to their respective BRIDGE CLUBs, envisioned and motivated. Unfortunately, the camp was cancelled this year, due to the corona virus pandemic. The BCIO Management was deeply saddened of the situation, until the 2020 Head Office Members proposed organizing a Virtual PA Camp.



What it means to be a PA:

Being a Peace Ambassador is a lifelong experience and at the same time it's a great responsibility. To give an idea about the roles and responsibilities of a PA along with its benefits, Ms. Erin Maitland (BCIO Assistant Manager) conducted a session in which she elaborated the concept of being a PA. She shared that PAs set on a pathway of becoming a

Global BRIDGE Leader and eventually contribute to the BCIO network. She then talked about the goals of a Peace Ambassador, which aside from giving input in local BC also included forming long lasting friendships around the globe. The highlight of the whole session was her own personal story of her experience from being a JA to the position of BCIO Assistant Manager.



Creating impact through BRIDGE CLUBs:

With advancement in technology, people are more aware now and hence lots of organizations exist and lots of work is being done. Which brings about a question "What's the impact of all this work?". With the passage of time "Impact" of project/activity/work is becoming more and more important and is held as one of key things to measure success. BRIDGE CLUBs have been around for years and have evolved over the course of time. Hence teaching them about focusing on creating an Impact was necessary. So that they can conduct activities the results of which can be measured and gauged.

The session was delivered by Mr. M. Moiz A. Qazi (HOM 2020), in which he talked about the need of an impact and enabled PAs to learn tools and methods by which they can frame their impact statements and plan their projects/activities by keeping impact in mind, how to relate projects to SDGs and apply for funding.

Afterwards the PAs were divided into groups in which they were to come up with impactful activities. PAs came up with the following interesting ideas.


- Group 1: Tree plantation
- Group 2: Teaching basic yet necessary software to kids
- Group 3: Helping people facing economic & social impacts of the current pandemic
- Group 4: Stationary drive for kids



Critical Analysis of PA Tasks:

The PAs were given some tasks that they were to carryout to access the present knowledge and working of their BRIDGE CLUBs. The tasks of this year focused on member participation, conformity to action plans, identifying problems within BRIDGE CLUBs with an effort to solve them & the ability to market themselves. The tasks were complex and focused on team work rather than individual work.

The PAs did a great job at finishing those tasks to the best of their knowledge, but after analysis; a room for improvement was found. So, the whole session focused on framing action plans common errors, common problems, elaboration of concepts, and tips to conduct meetings were discussed. The PAs were shown best samples from among the tasks with an aim to learn, improve and succeed. The sessions were jointly conducted by Mr. M. Moiz A. Qazi & Ms. Garima Khakurel (HOMs 2020)



Announcement of an activity:


The PAs were given an activity to post about their learnings on social media pages with hashtag #VirtualPACamp2020 to let the world know. The PAs did a great job, they shared

At the end of Day 1, to provide the PAs with an opportunity to loosen up and enjoy the company of each other. Nidhi Parekh (BCIO Assistant Manager) introduced a game to be played virtually. The game included some certain questions & tasks and the PAs who answered/completed them first and in an amazing way were given points for that. The PAs amazed the team with amazing skills and enthusiasm and shortly it became one of the best memories of the Virtual Camp. The winner of the game was Nguyen Truc Quynh (PA 2020 from Vietnam)



Day 2:

Problem Solving Within A BRIDGE CLUB:

Day 2 of the Virtual PA camp started with a short reflection of how Day 1 went followed by a session by Ms. Garima Khakurel (HOM 2020) on Problem Solving Within a BRIDGE CLUB. The session focused on the basic framework that should be followed while solving any problem in an organization. The first half of the session consisted of the presentation on problem-solving using the IDEA approach (Identify, Develop, Execute and Assess) along with an example for solving the problem of 'Keeping BC Members Active.'

After the presentation, PAs were divided into 4 groups where they had to come up with causes and solutions to the problem assigned to them. The groups did a good analysis of the problems assigned to them and came up with ideas to solve them. Following were the causes and the solutions to the problems in BRIDGE CLUBs assigned to different groups:

Group 1: Issues in Funding

Causes:

Lack of resources

Lack of Leadership - There might not be enough people in a leadership position to handle finances

Unforeseen circumstances like COVID 19 that might cause the sponsors to hesitate.

Solution:

Use the branding materials such as resume and video profile of the organization. Have a meeting and form a team to manage finances with a clear set of tasks.

Group 2: Introducing Each Members to Doors+

Causes:

Inactive Members for a long time Lack of Communication Lack of Knowledge about Doors+

Solution:

Use members database to inform them about Doors+

Providing information about Doors+ to the BRIDE CLUB members via presentation

Encouraging members to make Doors+ Account

Provide more opportunities to increase OMOIYARI points for the members

Survey among members about their account status to assess before and after the problemsolving.

Group 3: Retaining the Professional Members

Causes

Age difference of the members Lack of incentives for the members Tight schedule of professional members Some members being abroad

Solutions:

Organize seminars and workshops

Promote younger members to actively participate in the BRIDGE CLUB activities

Conduct activities at the most convenient times

Organize virtual activities

Organize impactful activities that fascinate members

Group 4: Maintaining Branding of the BCs

Causes:

Social network sites of BRIDGE CLUBs only post content related to BC

Solution:

Create more inclusive posts

Create content to promote BRIDGE CLUB more through create artwork, images, videos, redesign the logo

Introduce and promote the respective countries through the BRIDGE CLUBs pages



BRIDGE CLUB Professional Network:

A session on the BRIDGE CLUB Professional Network was provided to the Peace Ambassadors by Mr. Arief Adinoto (BCIO General Manager). The session focused on the basic introduction of the BCPN along with its vision and mission. The presenter also talked about how BCPM differs from BRIDGE CLUBs and the kind of opportunities it provides. The session also included stories about the success of BCPN.



Next PA Camp Requirements and the Way Forward:

The session was conducted by Ms. Nidhi Parekh (BCIO Assistant Manager). In the session, she talked about what the Peace Ambassadors are supposed to do after the Virtual Camp and how they need to prepare their BRIDGE CLUB for the next PA camp. The session was fun and interactive.



Feedback from Peace Ambassadors:



Though we all felt disappointed about the cancellation of the Summer Camp in Fukuoka, the Virtual PA Camp provided us Peace Ambassadors with a wonderful opportunity to connect and feel a part of APCC organization and community. On the first day I didn't know what to expect, but soon felt relaxed and involved. I enjoyed the first activity where we each introduced ourselves and shared something interesting about our countries. It made the world feel a little closer at

this time. It was great to hear from Erin about her experiences, and the opportunities that can come from involvement in this program.
